FATHER KEN'S CORNER



Dear Sisters and Brothers of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

Mother's Day Weekend is one of those wonderful occasions when we can express our love for the person who in many, many instances is the premier person who shapes and guides our lives. From birth until that time when we approach adolescence and we seek to become more independent, she is the one we turn to for healing, for protection, for advice, for understanding, and for comfort when we're hurting. Indeed, moms and their children disagree, argue, become angry and frustrated with each other as no earthly relationship is prefect; yet I think it's safe to say that our mothers show us how to love through the love they give us in those early formative years of our lives.

It's in this regard that we celebrate Mother's Day. We aren't patriotic with love of our country only on the 4th of July, but we gather together in a special way to demonstrate that patriotism that is present all through the year. The same with the celebration of Thanksgiving. There is a day to express the thanks that we may not fully show on any number occasions when we should. Mother's Day, Father's Day are those occasions when we more fully explicit the love we may fail to show on a regular basis.

On this Mother's Day, we look to our Blessed Mother and we remember the story of how she became a mother, while still remaining perpetually a virgin. Her 'Yes' was a yes of love – a love of God the source of all love – a 'yes' to bring this special life into the world despite taking on a mission that must have been very intimidating and somewhat fearful. If you think about it, what woman when she discovers that she's pregnant doesn't have similar feelings as Mary had? Her 'yes' to an act of love brings her into unexplored territory. Will my child be born healthy? Will I know what to do in those first days after this baby is born? Will this child's father support me and stand by me in the same way as St. Joseph stood by Mary, even in his own uncertainty and fear?

We see the joys and fears, the trust and the sorrows in Mary's life as she watched her son grow and develop. Was Mary any different in these feelings than any other mother before or after? We can assume, that as difficult as it was for Jesus to leave her to begin his ministry of preaching and teaching and healing, it was just as hard for Mary – and any mother – not to interfere when it's time for her bird to leave the nest and fly on its own.

Let us commit ourselves to celebrating this Mother's Day with all our heart. Let us put any misunderstandings, frustrations or anger behind us in honor of who our mothers are. Last year, my siblings and I gathered to see our mom in her room at the assisted living facility where she was living guessing that it would be the last holiday we would have together – and she did pass away a month later. Like many others who have lost either of their parents, I look back wondering if there were times when I could have expressed my love for her a little more obviously beyond Mother's Day or her birthday or Christmas. What were those instances when I could have made her feel more special on a regular basis? I ask the question of myself as a inducement for anyone whose mom is still living. I ask this question of myself for all of us who may not actively show the love we feel for anyone close to us.

As we honor and celebrate our mothers in a special way this weekend, beyond the extraordinary treatment of taking her out for a meal, Mother's Day cards, sweets or various presents, I ask you to tell mom two things. First, tell her that you love her. Second, tell her that you're praying for her. That's what I'm going to do to celebrate the gift of my mom's life – that's what we all should do every day.

When the Lone Ranger and Tonto rode across our TV screens in days of old, someone would often ask, "Who was that masked man?" Folks never learned his identity, and it didn't matter. Responses to Pope Francis

Thank you for you well-thought responses to Pope Francis' question: Do you believe that gun control is just a second amendment issue or should it be seen as a pro-life issue? We appreciate hearing the personal opinions from our parishioners.

To conflate the second amendment with pro- life issues perpetuates meaningless rhetoric. Anything short of instilling respect for human life is but a band-aid. Let's return to The Ten Commandments to fight the blind descent into a soul-less society. Any society/government that supports abortion as health care loses credibility when it comes to framing the second amendment as a threat to human dignity. "Guns don't kill people; people kill people." I agree with The Pope about supporting non violence, but such a philosophy begins with formation, not with the heavy hand of politics. Idealism is

noteworthy, but it needs a strong and consistent underpinning to support it.

The second amendment comes into play with a responsible person being able to own firearms that are in common view while also having the ability to bear/carry these arms discretely. (concealed from general view). This is done for their own safety as well as for the safety of others around them. It is also a pro-life issue because the tool, which is a firearm, can be used to save lives. It can be used to protect people from others that mean them harm. If a crazed person entered the church intent on harming people, I pray that there would be someone there within the congregation that had the training and tool (firearm) needed to stop the person. I whole heartedly believe in what Pope Francis stated; that nonviolence should always guide our actions. The unfortunate reality is that there are people within our society that no amount of talking or de-escalation will work on. The question is, and then what? The good shepherd carries a staff to defend his flock from the wolf. A good community member, if they so choose, should likewise be able to carry a firearm and be that same defender of the flock. I believe it is definitely a pro-life issue; when so many of our innocent school children and people just going about their daily lives, at church, at work, shopping have been killed by assault rifles. These assault rifles should be banned to the general public and licensing of other firearms should strictly be monitored by

age and only given after stringent background checks and a long waiting period.

• The 2nd Amendment states: the people have a right to bear arms under a well regulated militia.

This amendment has been interpreted, reinterpreted and distorted by the masses to bring us to this point in history. Gun control is the logical consequence of this distortion. 
and then things will change.




