FATHER KEN'S CORNER



Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

Many of you who read this column will remember the days before the Second Vatican Council when Catholics over the age of reason (about 7 years old) were obliged to fast from meat on ALL **Fridays** of the year, not just, as present, during the Season of Lent. It was a really 'big deal' which everyone hoped and waited for when bishops throughout the country would formally announce that they would give a dispensation from the fast on the Friday after Thanksgiving, lest good food from the day before be wasted.

Most Americans wouldn't be aware of this, but back in September of 2011, bishops in England and Wales announced that they would call Catholics in that area to revive the centuries old tradition of fasting from meat on Fridays. In the ensuing years, research shows that although only about 28% of the country's population followed through on shifting their dietary habits at the bishops' request, 55% of the those following the request said that they ate meat at only one meal on Fridays and the remainder swapped meat for other staples like fish or cheese. As you can imagine, the take-out pizza industry saw a large increase in sales.

There was another benefit as well. A study by the University of Cambridge indicated that by cutting out or reducing meat from their diet one day during the week, those Catholics involved, saved the equivalent of more than 55,000 tons of pollution *each year* according to *Phys.org*. That was compared to roughly the pollution produced by 82,000 people flying from London to New York.

Certainly, it would be difficult to evaluate those claims. Yet, even not relying on those particular findings, if there was a definite and substantial positive impact on the environment, would YOU consider fasting from meat on Fridays throughout the entire year? Pope Francis has already highlighted the acute need for all the people of the world to have a greater awareness of what each person is personally able to do to contribute to protecting the environment. In his words, there "is a moral imperative for action on the climate emergency and the important role of civil society in achieving sustainability through lifestyle change."

Consider the claim above about cutting pollution through one day of fasting in England and Wales being extended to the more than one billion Catholics around the world. Researchers claim that if only American Catholics upheld the same meatless Friday tradition, we'd see more than TWENTY TIMES the environmental impact compacted to the U. K. study.

As you probably know, way back in the "Medieval Ages" (starting about the 12th century), the church IMPOSED a mandatory fast on Fridays so that Catholics would unify themselves with the suffering of Christ on Good Friday. In reality, this first was aimed more at the upper classes who could afford to have meat whenever they wanted. Nonetheless, as economic conditions improved for the vast majority of people who were working class, all Catholics continued to be obliged to fast on Fridays. Today, although popularly and almost universally ignored, the conditions set by the bishops' conference for eating meat on Fridays IS STILL IN FORCE by performing another sacrificial act in place of fasting from meat.

Many would argue today, that most Catholics under the age of 75 have lost (or perhaps never had) that sense of sacrifice in their daily lives. I can remember as a child accidentally having meat on a Friday and having to confess it as a serious sin before receiving Holy Communion the next Sunday; or even as the meat was still in my mouth, spitting it out before swallowing – that's how seriously this sense of sacrifice was seen. The bottom line is simple – fasting from meat on Fridays is not only a personal way of sharing in the sufferings of Christ, but apparently a societal means of helping to save the planet. Talk about one action having a Double Positive Effect!!

In his book All I Really Need to Know I Learned in Kindergarten, Robert Fulghum lists those basic qualities that enable us to negotiate the rest of life somewhat successfully. It's what you might expect the curriculum of kindergarten to be about: being kind, saying you're sorry, getting along with others, and sharing. In short, what we learned in kindergarten is about putting others' needs ahead of our own comfort. It's a kind of emptying of our selfishness that seems to take place.

Unfortunately, the process isn't finished by the time we reach adulthood. We still tend to hoard, slam one another with insults, cheat in business, and neglect to apologize. In spite of that extended learning curve that seems to take place, we slowly do take on those attitudes noted by Fulghum. Marriage can smooth our rough edges. Children's needs call for self-sacrifice. Aging tends to mellow us. And somewhere along the line we learn that talking things out works better than hitting.

Saint Paul encouraged the Philippians to take on the attitude of the Lord Jesus, who emptied himself for our sake. Still, I think much of that emptying takes place in us unconsciously. Some would say it is simply the process of life. Maybe, but then again it may be the gentle hand of God. Saint Teresa of Calcutta is said to have commented that even God can't fill what is already full. So then maybe that emptying is God's way of making room for God. •

Adoration

Church's Teaching on Adoration of the Holy Eucharist

The Church strongly encourages both private and public devotion toward the Eucharist and teaches that prayer the Lord sacramentally present in the Eucharist actually "extends the union with Christ which the faithful have received in communion." It helps them to live in a more Christian way, trying "to maintain in their lives what they have received by faith and by Sacraments". (*The Rites of the Catholic Church*)

During times of public Adoration, when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed by a priest or deacon, "there should be prayers, songs, and readings to direct the faithful to the worship of the Lord, to encourage a prayerful spirit. There should be readings from Scripture with a homily or brief exhortation to develop a better understanding of the Eucharistic mystery. It is also desirable for people to respond to the Word of God by singing and to spend periods of time in religious silence. Part of the Liturgy of the Hours may be celebrated to extend the praise and thanksgiving of Holy Mass

"The elements of prayer, the Scriptures, praise, and silence are all an integral part of public Adoration. All the elements of the public Adoration should acknowledge the marvelous presence Of Christ in the Sacrament and foster the worship which is due to Christ in spirit and truth. Such public adoration of the Blessed Sacrament must clearly express its relationship to the Mass". (*The Rites of the Catholic Church*)






The Parable of the Workers in the Vineyard
