FATHER KEN'S CORNER



Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

Our college age parishioners have long gone off to their institutions of higher learning, our local high schools and grammar schools are back on track, and summer vacations, along with those wonderful carefree days of summer are just a happy memory. Either willingly or not, for most of us, the past two weeks after Labor Day have seen us returning to our usual routines. It's very good that we can settle in and anticipate an ordered schedule with a sense of comfort. At school, at work, within the home a steady rhythm is truly important for both mind and spirit.

Professionals in both the educational and psychological sectors have emphasized that it is especially important for our young people to develop a routine for a greater sense of security. While important for all of us to know what to expect and what is expected of us on a daily basis, there is a greater need for our children, and in particular those who may be shy, a little withdrawn, or emotionally sensitive, to have the comfort of a good routine of meals, study and homework, television and video games time, sleeping and waking up on time.

This "comfort of routine" – this peace of mind - also **needs to be extended to the spiritual practice and religious formation of every age group.** It's important that we have the opportunity to get into a "different routine from the days of the week" whatever it might be for the weekends as well. It doesn't matter what that weekend routine may be – participation with a sports teams, chores around the house, Saturday morning cartoons and food shopping for the next week – **the weekend routine also applies to our worship and participation at Mass.** This cycle of life both during the week and weekends needs to include family prayers before meals, prayers before bed, a quick prayer of thanks upon waking, Religious Formation classes and, of course, Sunday Mass.

Whatever our age, no matter how busy we may be, we need to establish our spiritual routine in a formal manner, just as we would schedule any other event that is important. As we wouldn't want to miss a doctor's appointment and we know that soccer practice is every Tuesday at 3:30, so too it's imperative – especially for adults - **to write down the times set aside for prayer** – our personal time with God. In this way, if it is written down in our calendars – lunch noon to 12:30, prayer 12:30 to 12:40, meetings 12:45 to 3pm, we'll follow the schedule for time with God just like any other event. Just as it would have to be something extremely out of the ordinary for us to miss a scheduled meeting with our boss or supervisor, so too concerning missing with our scheduled meeting with God (the ultimate boss if you will). We absolutely need to treat this 'appointment with God' as seriously as any other. We may complain that our calendars control our lives, yet those same calendars (written on paper or electronic) lend both order and security to our days.

And so too in the lives of our children. At an early age they are instructed as to what is expected of them in school, and so too it must be with their spiritual lives, in regard to both their religious formation classes, personal prayer and Sunday mass. At the parish of the Good Shepherd we are dedicated to helping you map out the spiritual routine of your children. **They need to be here – and so do you.** Our FAMILY MASS is celebrated each week at 10:00am. And each Sunday, both in the morning and at 5pm (with a fantastic new music minister – check him out), these masses will be designated as class level masses – the liturgy more directly tuned to our 2nd or 3rd or 7th grade students.

Parents, please, please, please!! Establish a daily prayer time with your children; establish a weekly Mass time with them. Please establish a Mass routine for yourself. Take advantage of this time to come together as a family along with other families of faith. Please, don't let other social or sports events become more important than being here with Jesus your God, and receiving your Lord and Savior in Holy Communion. Please remember that what you show your children as an important priority in your life, they will also see as something important in their lives as well.

Good News!

October 2, 2022

Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time (C)
Hb 1:2-3; 2:2-4; 2 Tm 1:6-8, 13-14; Lk 17:5-10

That is so easy to say and so hard to do. This might be because we misunderstand what faith is and what it might do. Today’s readings offer us three glimpses into what the Bible means by faith.

The reading from Habakkuk and the Gospel passage seem to contradict each other. The Gospel suggests that one can do wondrous things if one’s faith is strong enough. Many people understand this literally and then are confused and terribly disappointed when things do not turn out as they wanted. Habakkuk is in a dire situation. He had turned to God, but it seems to no avail: “You do not intervene” (Habakkuk 1:2). What response did he get? “Don’t give up. Don’t lose faith.”

Paul’s letter was written to Timothy, one of Paul’s own converts to faith in the risen Lord. Paul encourages Timothy to remain steadfast in that faith. It’s clear that faith is not solely a set of beliefs and doctrines; it is a way of life—one that follows and is inspired by the example Jesus’ life provides. It is also clear that living such a life might be dangerous, as evidenced by Paul’s own imprisonment.

Reading the Gospel passage again after considering these reflections, one might understand the power of faith in a new way. Perhaps the mulberry tree stands for the struggles that had to be endured by Habakkuk, the danger that Timothy faced in a hostile world, and the hurdles that challenge our own faith. It assures us that if we don’t lose faith, we also can do wondrous things.



LITURGICAL MINISTER TRAINING—FALL 2022

Training for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion And Lectors

Dear Pastors,

We are pleased to offer Liturgical Minister Training this Fall. Please note, however, that we will train only those individuals recommended by you. Publicity information that you can share in your bulletin will be provided for your use.

How to Register for Liturgical Minister Training

Each pastor who has suitable candidates he wishes to be trained as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion and/or Lectors must send a nomination letter to Bishop Barres requesting the training. One letter from each parish is fine, as long as each individual attending is named on it. This letter must indicate the date, location and type of training session each person(s) will attend and should be received at least five days prior to the training session.

Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion: Part A - This training is required for **all** those who are beginning as Ministers. This "BASIC" training is required for **all** Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Those who wish to minister in hospitals, nursing homes and to the homebound are required to attend Part B training in addition to BASIC training. One **must** attend Part A training prior to Part B training.

Tuesday, Nov. 15 - St. Elizabeth / Melville - Msgr. Kane Hall; 6:30 pm - 9:30 pm

*This is the first time we are offering Part A and Part B on the SAME day. Those who attend Part A in the morning are welcome to bring lunch or leave for lunch and return for the 1pm Part B session.

Fees and Contact Information

For Fall 2022, the registration fee for this training will be \$25 for EMHC for each Part A and Part B and \$20 for Lectors. Each parish will be billed after the training sessions have been completed. Once the training has been paid for, the Pastor will be issued identification cards for those who have been trained as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. These cards may then be distributed to the newly trained Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion at a commissioning ceremony at a time of the Pastor's choosing. Certificates of Completion will be provided to those who attend Lector Training. Please send your nomination letters to Suzanne Lynn at the Office of the Western Vicariate. AT THE MOVIES with Donna...

“Minions : The Rise of Gru” – This is the fifth installment in the “Despicable Me” franchise. In this prequel, a very young Gru already has dreams of becoming a supervillain and tries to join a notorious gang. Regardless of the story line, young Gru and those loveable minions make this a fun-filled treat. Filled with wonderful celebrity voices like Julie Andrews, Alan Arkin, Taraji P. Hanson, Dolph Lundgren, Jean-Claude Van Damme, and Michelle Yeoh, it is fast-paced with excellent animation. Steve Carell is back as the voice of Gru, and does a fine job making his younger voice believable. And then there is the genius and creativity of Pierre Coffin, who is the voice of all those minions. Well directed by Brad Ableson and Jonathan del Val, with a good screenplay written by Matthew Fogel, which is really about loyalty and true friendship.

“Thor: Love and Thunder” – In this sequel to the 2017 “Thor: Ragnarok”, we find Thor on a mission in search of inner peace. Meanwhile, we are introduced to a new villain, Gorr, a man unable to save his young daughter from starving to death. Filled with hate, he blames the Gods for her death and vows to kill them all. Along the way, Thor’s former love, Jane Foster, returns as Mighty Thor, and just for extra measure, toss in a few Gods, like Zeus and Hercules. Somehow, Thor has become a comical character, a source of idiocy, rather than a great super hero. Directed and co-written by Taika Waititi, with Jennifer Kaytin Robinson, with a cast that includes Chris Hemsworth, Natalie Portman and Tessa Thompson. The only bright spot in this movie is Christian Bale in his portrayal of Gorr. He is just terrific. If not for his performance, this would be the first Marvel film that doesn’t reach the mark.

“Where the Crawdads Sing” – Based on the best-selling novel written by Delia Owens, a young girl is left to fend for herself in the marshlands of North Carolina. Through the kindness of a couple who run the local general store and a childhood friend, who teaches her to read and write, she learns to survive only to be caught up in a murder trial. Well directed by Olivia Newman, with the adapted screenplay by Lucy Alibar, and beautiful cinematography by Polly Morgan. Terrific ensemble cast that includes Daisy Edgar-Jones, Jojo Regina, Taylor John Smith, Michael Hyatt, Sterling Macer Jr., and the always fantastic David Strathairn – who just makes every film he is in, that much better.

“Mrs. Harris Goes to Paris” - This is the third film adapted from the 1958 novel, Mrs. ‘Arris Goes to Paris by Paul Gallico. It’s the 1950’s and a widowed cleaning lady falls madly in love with a couture Dior dress. Working hard to earn the money, she goes to Paris, buys a dress from the House of Dior and her life is changed forever. Ah yes, every girl’s dream. This is such a charming, feel-good movie. Terrific direction by Anthony Fabian, who co-wrote the adapted screenplay. Expert cinematography by Felix Wiedemann, who captures the heart of Paris. Imagine, seeing the Eiffel Tower illuminating through the open bedroom window at night. The perfect cast ensemble led by the wonderful Lesley Manville, Ellen Thomas, Jason Isaacs, Isabelle Huppert, Lambert Wilson and Alba Baptista. Sometimes, we all feel invisible; whether it’s because other people make us feel that way or we just don’t have enough faith in ourselves. And as we grow older, our dreams still remain, but somehow the idea of obtaining them seems doubtful. This movie gives us hope that there still remains a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel. Anything is possible. One of the best movies of the year, “Mrs. Harris Goes to Paris” is a treasure!

“DC League of Super-Pets” – This 3D computer animated superhero film is based on the DC Comics Legion of Super-Pets. When Superman and the Justice League are kidnapped, it is up to Krypto, Superman’s dog, to save the day. Such a creative idea, this film is exciting, very funny, and smart. Perhaps more for the adult audience, younger children will be sure to find the pets adorable. Talented, all-star cast that voice these characters include Dwayne Johnson, Kevin Hart, John Krasinski, Keanu Reeves, Olivia Wilde, Vanessa Bayer, Diego Luna, Kate McKinnon, just to name a few. 


