FATHER KEN'S CORNER



Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

Over the past 18 months or so preparations for the Roman Synod were made all around the world in hopes of finding possible answers or common approaches and talking points for a number of issues that we are facing as a church. You may remember that we here at Good Shepherd, along with parishes throughout the diocese, the country was asked to put forward our thoughts and feelings on what we felt were important to the future trajectory of our history. Many, many thoughts and feelings were boiled down into a smaller number of topics which the Synod, bishops, priests and lay people were given the opportunity to discuss and hopefully move closer to resolving some of these vital interests in the life of the church.

After reading numerous articles on the Synod which concluded on October 28th after a three-week gathering, what I can tell you is this. While there was unanimity that a renewal in the Eucharistic Life of the church — especially in the need for the faithful to have a deeper understanding and devotion to Jesus himself in the Eucharist — those attending the synod were very much divided on almost every question that was brought up for discussion. Some participants were very pleased that issues like church policy making were debated by bishops and everyday Catholics — and others felt that there was just too much give and take by those they considered not sufficiently theologically versed. And as might be expected, a number of the lay participants pointed out that the issues weren't merely theological questions, but based in the reality of everyday life of which they felt a number of clerics were out of touch.

As you might suspect, the synod ended very much divided over the questions of the role of women in the church, especially the question of whether it is possible for women to be ordained as deacons. The other very potent and explosive issue that peaked and continues to raise emotions on both sides was the question of how far the welcoming of the LGBTQ+ community should extend. The basis of the theological discussion was in essence whether it was possible for the church to bless same-sex couples (as a question put forth by Pope Francis) in their relationship if those benedictions were not equal to the blessings a couple receives in the sacrament of Holy Matrimony.

I could go into a very long thesis here but suffice it to say that the conundrum finds its basis that from the very beginning it was understood that any sexual act outside of the marital relationship is sinful. So how could a legitimate blessing be given to any couple outside the marriage covenant? At the same time, how does the church effectively minister to the LGBTQ+ community who are in loving, long term relationships and need a blessing as much as anyone else?

While there is widespread agreement that there is an important need to give women a greater role in decision making in the life of the church, there was much greater disagreement as to whether that role involved the ordination of women as deacons. At the end of the synod, Pope Francis renewed his call that women be given governance posts in the church, many of these are posts or positions which do NOT require a cleric, but traditionally have been given to priests and bishops.

While each of us may have feelings – and rather strong ones – as to the validity or necessity of some of what I have summarized from the synod, we must realize that the church, while One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic, has an incredible diversity of both culture and tradition. While you and I may or may not be comfortable in seeing a woman in the role of a deacon preside at baptisms and weddings and preach on occasion at Sunday Liturgy (as happens here and many places around the world), it would be very much against the culture of any number of regions of the globe for this to happen. It is similar to the LGBTQ+ community. While some may be uncomfortable and unfamiliar with these communities but otherwise as tolerant as possible, there are other regions, especially in Africa, where they are seen as outlaws persecuted and imprisoned.

Thus, not being wiser than the participants of the synod, I present simply what is. The body of the church is divided and while we may possess the mind of Jesus in many aspects of life, the mind of Christ on the above-mentioned issues isn't sufficiently clear. The fact that we struggle with "WWJD" – What Would Jesus Do – testifies that we still don't fully understand His teachings in the gospel.

The dark of night can unsettle and frighten children,

but darkness can disturb adults, too. It's not so much the feeling when the lights go off that unsettles us grownups as it is the dark of uncertainty. We graduate from school and wonder what to do with our lives. Should we stay in a relationship? How do we find meaning again in the midst of grief and the loss of someone we love? And sometimes most of all, where is God when we need God? We may even wonder whether to believe. At such times, we bump and bruise our way through the obstacles that life's darknesses cause.

Leonard Cohen's song "Anthem" echoes a note of hope when we feel lost in the dark as he sings about how light always seems to find a way to seep in between the cracks of our everyday living. Like stars that are visible only at night, new opportunities are often most readily recognized when we find ourselves stumbling through the dark.

Long before Leonard Cohen, Jesus told the parable of ten virgins, some wise and some foolish. In the midst of that story, he tells of a bridegroom who comes to the waiting virgin attendants at midnight. In other words, it is the Lord God who comes into our lives in the darkest times, if only we are wise enough to recognize such a coming.

How then to negotiate the darkness? Stay the course. In time, wisdom reveals a path. Trust that light will come, all in God's time and not ours. Finally, wisdom always comes in the darkest of times, seldom when our lives are bright as day. •







At the Movies with Donna

"A Haunting in Venice" – In this third installment following Agatha Christie's mastermind detective, Hercule Poirot, we find him reluctantly attending a séance at a haunted palazzo. Now retired and refusing to get involved in any case, unwillingly he becomes immersed in the mystery of a year-old suicide. Once again, multi-talented Kenneth Branagh serves as director and portrays the eclectic Poirot. Well written script by Michael Green with a top-notch cast that includes Michelle Yeoh, Jamie Dornan, Tina Fey, Jude Hill and Kelly Reilly. Terrific cinematography by Haris Zambarloukos, whether it's inside the palazzo or scanning the picturesque Venice. No matter the story, the mystery or the suspense; it is Branagh himself, who makes us flock to the theater. Those striking blue eyes, that immense mustachethat can be a character all on its own, and his deliberate and purposeful delivery of every line make for a great Poirot and an enjoyable movie experience.

"The Creator" – This science-fiction thriller is set in the future where war wages between humans and Artificial Intelligence (AIs), who have taken on the appearance of humans. Since the western world believes that the AIs and humans cannot co-exist, the AIs must be destroyed, along with their Creator. Well directed by Gareth Edwards, who also co-wrote the script with Chris Weitz. The terrific cast includes John David Washington, Gemma Chan, Ken Watanabe, Allison Janney and Madeleine Yuna Voyles. This is an original and interesting concept, a story of hope and unlikely bonds. Who is to say that one day humans will have to live alongside AI beings, if so, it seems very likely that discrimination will still exist as well. There is one thing, however, that humans and even AIs strive for and that is to be loved. This is not for everyone, but for those of you who do see this film, don't be surprised if you find yourself thinking about it weeks later. Somehow, it stays with you.

"Killers of the Flower Moon" – Based on the 2017 book written by David Grann, this is the true story of a series of murders in the Osage Nation in Oklahoma during the 1920's, after they discovered oil on tribal land. Directed by the legendary Martin Scorsese, who also co-wrote the screenplay with Eric Roth, this epic film could not be achieved without collaboration of Scorsese's esteemed team – stunning cinematography by Rodrigo Prieto, excellent editing by Thelma Schoonmaker, sweeping production design by Jack Fisk and musical score by the late Robbie Robertson. And of course, the stellar cast led by Leonardo DiCaprio, Robert De Niro, Lily Gladstone and Jesse Plemons. This film is 3 hours and 27 minutes long, and yet, there is not one second wasted. It has plenty of violence at times and you will find yourself uneasy watching the Osage people being treated so unfairly, the corruption, racial hatred and the senseless deaths all for money. It is a heartbreaking film. It leaves you unsettled and will lay heavy on your mind.

"The Holdovers" - Set in 1970, this comedy-drama is about three lonely people who are stuck at a New England boarding school during the Christmas holidays. Paul Hunham, Mary Lamb and Angus Tully — no one can be more different then these 3 and yet, an unlikely bond of friendship and caring is formed between them. This is good-ole movie making at its best! It's funny, it's sad, it's poignant. Director Alexander Payne has not always been one of my favorites, but this time, he hits it out of the park. With a sharp and witty screenplay written by David Hemingson, that is warm and touching. The cast is just superb — Paul Giamatti is fantastic, Da'Vine Joy Randolph is perfect and the new comer, Dominic Sessa, is just terrific. Everyone of us has a story to tell and we all carry some form of brokenness and every so often a movie comes along where you can connect to what those characters are dealing with, how they feel or who they are - this is one of those movies. Add it to the list.
