FATHER KEN'S CORNER



Dear Sisters and Brothers of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

As we ease into the end of the Liturgical Year, with next weekend being the Solemnity of Christ the King, our readings are reminding us that our TIME and our TALENTS are not our own, but gifts from God. Last week (the 32nd Sunday of Year A) we heard the parable of the ten wise and foolish maidens; five had the foresight to carry enough oil for their lamps as they awaited the groom to celebrate the wedding feast and five who ran out of oil, and were delayed because they needed to buy more oil and were locked out of the wedding feast. We may not have all the time we think to put our affairs in order to be ready for Christ's return in glory to judge the living and the dead – to reward those ready with lanterns (the light of their lives) burning and to lock out of the Kingdom of heaven those not ready. It is always a chilling thought that none of us knows the day or the hour.

Today we hear about the parable of the master who departs for an extended journey and entrusts three of his servants with Five, Two, and One Talent (or gold pieces). Two made wise investments and were rewarded upon the master's return; the third buried his master's money and made no profit with the money he was given and was punished. These talents (money. the gifts we possess like a good singing voice, the ability to create or build beautiful things, the time to help others) are given to the men in the parable – and to us – not for our own personal glorification but to be used for the praise and the glory of God.

Obviously, we can connect the two parables with the return of Jesus Christ marking the end of the age as we know it on this earth. Yet, how closely do we connect these two parables personally with OUR Good Deeds (the oil in our lamps lighting our way) and those gifts with which God has blessed us to be used profitably in God's service by service to others? While Jesus shares these parables with great crowds of people, they are meant for each individual, young and old, to apply them personally to themselves.

It is in this light that I appeal to your generosity in giving time and service to needs of your parish of the Good Shepherd. You are already generous in your financial support of the parish and our annual report will be published in the next few weeks. But we are in definite need of parishioners to share their time and talents with the community of faith. Just as we are thankful for many who serve the parish in many different ways, there is always more to be done.

We truly need for our school age children to become altar servers. While this ministry in recent tradition has fallen to the children of the parish, I would be happy to accept adults for the 7am Sunday morning mass. Parents of Teens and High School Students – I invite you to apply the meaning of these parables to yourselves in being Altar Servers, Lectors and Ushers for the 5pm Sunday Mass. ALL our choirs would benefit from new singers. These are the liturgical ministries in the church, BUT the parish would also benefit from people who would like to serve helping Doreen Bacile to enhance the décor of the church at Christmas and Easter. The Garden Ministry, Greeters, Woman's Auxiliary are always looking for new members. In preparing for some of the special events of the parish like the Tag Sale and the Fall Harvest sale, we need more people willing to 'learn the ropes' as our coordinators are more than willing to share the secrets of the trade and responsibilities of hosting an event. Some of our most accomplished people serving the parish have been doing so for many years and are looking for like-minded people who love the Parish of the Good Shepherd to succeed them.

I look to you who are reading this column to think how the parables of Jesus relate to you personally. As we look forward to the wonderful feast and celebration of Thanksgiving, one of the sure-fire ways of giving thanks, is by using the blessings bestowed upon us by God for the benefit of others. If you want to give glory to God for gifts and blessings received, we'll find a way to help you do so. After all, how many times have we heard Jesus himself say that HE has come TO SERVE, not be served. He was speaking to YOU & ME as well as his apostles.

Invite Marty into your home and the first thing he'll ask is whether or not you have any cats. Marty is allergic to cats, big time, even if they have been quarantined to another room. His eyes turn red. He sneezes. He begins to cough and wheeze like an old-time Model T. Cats are his nemesis. It is ironic that Marty has befriended a stray cat from his neighborhood. Though he never pets the kitty or allows him into his home, each day he feeds him and puts milk out for him on the deck outside his living room. And if the cat fails to come around, he worries about him.

There is something instinctive in us that moves us to care for the underdog, even if it's a cat. The Sunday Gospel this week suggests that the innate desire to care for the weakest among us is a Godly instinct. It's where we meet God, and we need to pay attention to it simply because it's how we come to a sense of God in our lives.

We all search for meaning, looking for it every day in the hidden corners of our lives and in the open daytimes of our busyness. Sometimes we find it, and sometimes we limp back home at the end of the day. More often than not it's when our day has been brushed with the color of caring for someone else that we feel good about that day. It's a Godly instinct that's not to be ignored. •



WHAT IS HAPPENING AROUND US? WHAT IS HAPPENING TO US?

It seems that the violent hatred which has infected the People of Palestine, and the People of Israel has touched every corner of the world like an inescapable ill wind which blows no good. This ill wind is like a Covid-19 virus which can't be seen, yet is breathed in like a toxic gas and has driven good people to commit acts of violent hatred and disregard for common courtesy which they normally would never do.

Let us start with the admission that nobody's hands are clean. Hamas has stated any number of times in the past, publicly, that they are committed to the destruction of the state of Israel. To that end they broke a truce back on October 7th and committed terrible acts of violent hatred against the Israeli People in southern Israel. Jews were murdered, kidnapped and large numbers of innocent people from many nations had been taken hostage and were being used as human shields or bargaining chips. From that day through today, the Government of Israel in both justice and now in terrible vengeance has also committed equally horrible acts of violent hatred against the population of Gaza in their attempt to destroy Hamas. Thousands upon thousands of civilians, men, women and children who have been trying to flee the bombings in Gaza have been killed.

This poison of hatred has infected the people of our own country like an invisible gas, widening the trajectory of violence from the Middle East. Acts of violence against Jews have increased over 300%. Acts of violence against anyone who looks like they may be a Muslim have also increased significantly and there have been attacks against people from India and Pakistan who have nothing to do with the violence between Jews and Muslims. Those of Palestinian heritage have been protesting against those of Jewish heritage and the opposite is also true. These organized protests have resulted in both violence and arrests. Last weekend over 100 thousand people rallied against antisemitism in Paris and over 300 thousand people gathered in London to demand a cease-fire. The so titled "Lone Wolves" have been on the prowl seeking targets on which to unleash their anger and they have succeeded in harming innocents on either side of the issue in this country.

That is the greater tragedy which is occurring beyond the death and destruction which we see on the news every night. While it is understandable that emotions run high, what is unacceptable and probably even sinful, is to unleash that emotion on people who have nothing to do with the violence which is occurring between the Jewish People and the Palestinian People. While great and horrible wrongs have been committed by both sides some 4,000 miles away, those same great and horrible wrongs are being committed here. There are communities with allegiances on either side who have lived in relative peace in the past who now are experiencing the tensions which seeped into the emotions of what the media is reporting. People who have known each other for years are now looking at each other with suspicion and distrust. This past Sunday "NEWSDAY" ran a full two page article about the interfaith bonds that are being tested in Nassau Country. There is no foreseeable fix in easing the tensions which none of these people right here on Long Island instigated. They live in different worlds except possibly with both Jews and Muslims condemning the attacks on children – there and right here.

While I have no practical answers, I merely wish to remind everybody, that no matter who we are, no matter where we have our roots and no matter what religious beliefs we may hold dear, that when we are cut, we all bleed. We all bleed red blood, we all are subject to physical and mental pain. For all our differences - in all the things that are important-WE ARE ONE; WE ARE HUMAN AND WE ARE ALL CHILDREN OF ONE GOD WORSHIPED IN DIFFERENT WAYS. Let's pray that the leaders on all sides may accept this truth and act on it.




