## **FATHER KEN'S CORNER**



Dear Sisters and Brothers of the Parish of the Good Shepherd,

You might have seen a television commercial recently about three elderly ladies watching others riding down a long hill. One of them buys what was needed for them to join in, and in the end they're waving their arms in the air, smiling and laughing as together they slide down the hill. Before they climb up the hill for another run, the caption simply states, "SHARE THE JOY."

Our feast of CHRISTMAS is simply GOD SHARING THE JOY OF THE GIFT OF SALVATION. "In the fullness of time, God sent his son, born of a woman, born a subject of the law, to redeem the subjects of the law, to enable us to be adopted as sons and daughters" (Galatians 4:4). In our joyous celebration of the birth of the Jesus, Son of God, we can be forgiven if we forget that this is also a moment in salvation history that is just as joyous and exultant for God. The entire universe was created for this moment. "He (Jesus) is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth. All things were created through him and for him." (Colossians 1:15-17) Jesus himself – The WORD of God - is the message and messenger of salvation.

We remember that the Christmas Narratives from St. Matthew and St. Mark have a number of touching and suspenseful moments which lead up to the wonder of Bethlehem. The birth of John the Baptist is foretold by an angel of the Lord appearing to the priest Zechariah. He is disturbed, frightened and very doubtful as he and his wife Elizabeth are advanced in years and she, throughout their marriage, has been unable to conceive. Zechariah is told that due to his unbelief, he will remain speechless until the birth of his son, the one who will be called *the "prophet of the Most High."* 

This same angel, Gabriel, is sent as a messenger by God to a young virgin named Mary and she is told that her child "will be Son of God". A man named Joseph also is visited by an angel in a dream and he is told not to be afraid to take Mary as his wife because this child is special and "you must name Jesus since he is the one who is to save his people from their sins."

To these three and to the many prophets of the Old Testament, God sends a messenger to guide, direct or inspire the children of Israel. *On the morning of Christmas, God no longer sends a messenger – God comes in Person to all creation to deliver the message of salvation*. It is GOD'S JOY to personally be with His people EVEN MORE than our joy that our God has come personally to save us. O Come, O Come, Emmanuel!! Our God is with us – not just in the birth of Jesus at Christmas, but in each Eucharistic gathering we celebrate.

I pray that as we celebrate the birth of the baby Jesus, our hearts will truly make room for him. The Three Kings, the Three Wise Men or Magi traveled long and far at the rising of his star to reach Jerusalem and finally Bethlehem "to give homage to the newborn king of the Jews." You and I have it far easier. While we set up scenes of the stable and manger in our homes and here in our church, the true cradle is the one of our souls — where the King of Kings can take rest each time we receive him in Holy Communion. In this season of giving, our greatest gift to Jesus is to joyfully and willingly be as faithful as the shepherds and come to adore him at Mass.

It is at each Eucharistic gathering that we are most powerfully reminded of how deeply, how intimately, how joyfully we are loved by Our God. In the name of the priests, deacons and entire staff of Good Shepherd Parish, I wish you a blessed Christmas celebration and may you know the joy that Our God desires to share with you and your families.

JOY TO THE WORLD! THE LORD IS COME; LET EARTH RECEIVE HER KING; LET EVERY HEART PREPARE HIM ROOM – AND HEAVEN AND NATURE SING.

FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

I asked some folks what they carried with them as their most treasured gift from their parents. One spoke of the gift of freedom. As an adult he always felt loved and welcomed by his parents. Although he was not always able to visit them as frequently as his life would allow, he was never made to feel guilty about it. It was an atmosphere unpressured by any "have-tos" whether it concerned choices for marriage or profession or simply for occasional family visits.

Another spoke of being taught by example that love in a family always extends to welcoming the stranger, caring for the unfortunate, opening one's home to those in pain. She learned to live that way because that was how her parents lived.

Yet another spoke of her father's gentleness and faithfulness as treasured gifts. And in truth she herself had become gentle and faithful, both with life and with God. Yet another took note of his parents' acceptance and openness to differing cultures and traditions and value systems. It was a way of living he now took to himself and his own family.

Not every family may seem as graced as these individuals remember their own families, and no doubt these families had flaws, too. Yet those qualities of a believer, enumerated by St. Paul in his Letter to the Colossians, make for good family life as well: "heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another. And over all these put on love" (Colossians 3:12–14). ●





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## **Christmas Message from Bishop Barres**



Christmas 2023

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

In recent years at Christmas, I have meditated on the relationship between the Nativity of the Prince of Peace and the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

I have been especially inspired by Pope Francis' analysis of the Parable of the Good Samaritan in the second chapter of his 2020 encyclical *Fratelli Tutti*. It is powerful and provocative, and I would recommend it for your mental prayer.

The short phrase in the Christmas Gospel narrative in the second chapter of the Gospel of Luke reads: "She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."

"No room for them in the inn." No Good Samaritan stepped up to help the Holy Family. They were ignored and treated perfunctorily and impatiently. Some passed them by. Some pretended not to notice their plight.

Remember too that in the Parable of the Good Samaritan an "inn" is also mentioned. Luke 10 reads: "But a Good Samaritan while traveling came near him, and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn and took care of him."

The inn that the Holy Family approaches on the way to Bethlehem is a sign of rejection and indifference.

The inn in the Parable of the Good Samaritan is a sign of the Good Samaritan's compassion and commitment to go the extra mile and to make sure that the wounded man is taken care of until he is completely healed.

Contemporary literary criticism might very well emphasize that the use of "inn" by the Gospel writer in both the Nativity in Luke 2 and the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10 is not by accident.

In a sense, the phrase "there was no room at the inn" in the Nativity foreshadows and connects with the phrase in the Parable of the Good Samaritan describing the callous indifference of both the priest and the Levite toward the wounded man on the side of the road: "[H]e passed by on the other side."

As Pope Francis says in *Fratelli Tutti*: "Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders."

Our Lady, St. Joseph and the unborn Christ Child experienced the reality of people who decided to be indifferent bystanders.

The Christmas Gospel narrative from Luke 2 poses a question which is posed again later in the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10.

Will we be Good Samaritans?

Or will we be indifferent bystanders?

As the Holy Father reminds us, we make that choice every day.

May our prayer, silent contemplation and creative family catechesis of the Nativity scene help us to be instruments of a Nativity Mystery. May the Good Samaritan Gospel revolution of humility, charity, mercy, tenderness and peace unite us in solidarity with the sick, the poor and the suffering, especially in the Middle East, Ukraine and all war-ravaged areas of the world.

May our commitment to "holiness and mission" bless our contemplative Synodal listening and our Eucharistic Revival and Evangelization.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

May the Light and Love of the Christ Child animate and guide our global Catholic Missionary Spirit on this Christmas night and throughout the New Year.

At our last meeting, with the help of our volunteers, we were able to make 610 sandwiches and 100 wash-up kits. Thank you!




